\$1-MILLION LEGACY GIFT CREATES TRANSFORMATIONAL BURSARIES FOR COMPUTER SCIENCE STUDENTS

Twelve computer science students in MacEwan University's Bachelor of Science and Bachelor of Arts programs will receive a major financial boost starting in 2022 – and every year after – thanks to a generous

\$1-million donation from an anonymous donor.

The Larissa Bursary, funded by an endowment created with the donation, will help students overcome financial challenges that could prevent them from finishing their studies – and ultimately ensure that well-educated graduates contribute to advancing an industry the anonymous donor cared deeply about.

"This gift makes a strong statement about the quality of MacEwan's programming and allows us to continue contributing to the resilience and recovery of our communities," says Dr. Annette Trimbee, president and vice-chancellor of MacEwan University. "I can't overstate the impact this gift will have. We are incredibly grateful."

Making it easier for those students to reach the end of their programs is the goal of the Larissa Bursary – the most generous financial award currently available to MacEwan students awards 12 students a year up to \$5,000 each.



MAJOR GIFT TO UNIVERSITY RECORD LABEL PAVES THE WAY FOR STUDENT-ENGAGED PROJECTS


Seeing student-designed album covers in Allard Hall inspired Dr. Craig Monk, MacEwan University's provost and vicepresident, Academic, to contribute a major gift to the university's record label, Bent River Records.

The label integrates students into its management team as research assistants, staff members and interns, working with artists, managing the label's online presence, handling licensing and distribution, and designing album cover art. Since its inception in 2015, Bent River has recorded and produced many albums, including its first vinyl record in 2019, and serves as an interdisciplinary lab for students to do research and take part in experiential learning.

Dr. Monk's \$50,000 gift funds the label's vinyl and special projects and encourages student engagement in all facets of producing a vinyl project.

"As MacEwan prepares for its 50th anniversary fundraising campaign, we see Dr. Monk's gift as an important lead gift," says Kevin Fitzgerald, associate vice-president, Alumni and Development. "It's a powerful example of how senior leaders can support student success at MacEwan."

MEMORIAL AWARD GRANTED TO STUDENT FOR COMMITMENT TO LGBTQ2S+ COMMUNITY



The Hayley Jayne Richman Memorial Award was established in memory of a passionate leader and supporter of the LGBTQ2S+ community. Richman encouraged everyone to seek academia and never to let any obstacles impact an education. Always waving her rainbow flag proudly, she selflessly volunteered her time and energy to her community and she continues to do so with this award posthumously.

Brendan Collinge, a third-year Bachelor of Communication Studies student majoring in journalism, was the 2020 recipient of the **Hayley Jayne Richman Memorial Award**, which supports students who are members of the LGBTQ2S+ community, allies of the community or those who have LGBTQ2S+ parents.

As a budding journalist, Brendan has reported on stories related to the LGBTQ2S+ community, including the art of drag shows, the efficacy of HIV preexposure prophylaxis (PrEP) and issues like transphobia. "After my studies, I hope to be an effective media voice in my community to help achieve social equity and justice for all of us," he says.

But it's not only in the media or in the classroom that Brendan is making a difference. Since moving to Edmonton to pursue post-secondary studies, he has made an effort to learn about and grow within the city's LGBTQ2S+ community and connect with people who have similar concerns and passions.

"When I'm finished my degree, I would like to continue helping provide a voice to important stories and aspects of life that sometimes get swept under the rug or go unnoticed."

COVID-19 RELIEF BURSARY COMES TO THE AID OF STUDENTS IN NEED

To help ease some of the financial burden for its students during the COVID-19 pandemic, MacEwan University established the COVID-19 Relief Bursary, which was made possible through the generosity of donors and redirected funding. The bursary provided support to qualified full-time students based on financial need.

Students pulled together to help their peers and classmates by contributing to the bursary as well. Jordyn Buchinski and Jilian Irwin, past and current president of the MacEwan chapter of the Canadian Nursing Students' Association (CNSA), were evaluating

applications for national student awards through their association and realized that there was a serious need for funds within their faculty at MacEwan.

"We decided to take the funds our chapter had raised for conferences and donate it to the university's COVID-19 Relief Bursary," says Buchinski. "We've always said that our group is here to support students – that we want the best for them. We knew that using any extra money we had to support students who are struggling right now was the right thing to do."

ALUM CELEBRATED FOR HER WORK AS PART OF NOBEL PEACE PRIZE-WINNING ORGANIZATION

Nearly four decades ago when she graduated from then-Grant MacEwan Community College, Brenda Barton (Advertising and Public Relations, '81) was interested in pursuing a career in advertising. She had no idea that by the end of 2020, she would be leading a team in Sri Lanka as part of her 30-year career with a Nobel Peace Prizewinning organization.

Since 1992, Barton has worked in various roles within the United Nations World Food Programme (WFP), which received the Nobel Peace Prize for 2020 for its efforts to combat hunger and its contributions to the betterment of conditions for peace in conflict-affected areas around the world.

"Receiving the Nobel Peace Prize is truly a proud and humbling moment to be part of the WFP team," says Barton.
